

HURRICANE SEASON BE PREPARED Updated June 9, 2025

Listen to your local radio and TV stations for information about tropical storms and hurricanes. They are the best informed and have the most up-to-date information.

- 1. Develop a family plan in advance of a storm threat
- 2. Be sure your cell phone is charged
- 3. Prepare a hurricane kit in advance of storm or hurricane warnings

A Supply Kit should be portable in case you have to evacuate and should include:

<u>Water</u>- have at least 1 gallon per person per day for drinking. Additional water will be needed for food preparation and personal hygiene.

<u>Food</u> - have at least enough for 3 to 7 days, Non-perishable packaged or canned, snack foods, non-electric can opener, cooking tools & fuel, paper plates, utensils, paper towels, etc.

Clothing- jacket, rain gear, sturdy shoes

Blankets and pillows

First Aid Kit & Prescriptions (glasses, dentures, hearing aids, etc.)

<u>Toiletries</u> - toothpaste & brush, deodorant, soap, shaving supplies, shampoo, washcloths & towels, toilet paper, pre-moistened wipes, etc.

Contacts - List of doctors, family members, etc.

Flashlight and batteries & extra batteries

Radio - battery operated & extra batteries

Keys - extra keys for home and car

<u>Important Documents</u> protected in waterproof container (insurance, medical records, bank account information, social security card, Driver's License, Birth Certificate, etc.) Make a list or take pictures of all valuables.

Entertainment - books, cards, puzzles

Vehicle fuel tank should be filled

Pets - ID and immunization records, food and water, carrier or cage, medications, muzzle, leash.

<u>Have a place to go</u> - Home of a family member or friend, motel, or shelter. If possible, evacuate to the home of friends or family in a non-vulnerable area. Next try a motel or hotel and as a last resort go to a shelter. Listen to the news to find out what shelters have been opened. Remember, shelters are not designed for comfort and do not usually accept pets.



Evacuate if told to do so. Do not get stranded. In areas under an official evacuation order, you must evacuate according to state law. RV and Mobile Home residents will be ordered to evacuate in all hurricanes. When you evacuate, notify the Resort Office and family or friends of when you are leaving and where you are going. Be aware of evacuation routes.

SECURE YOUR HOME

Close all awnings and board up windows and doors if possible

Take all loose items inside (Tables, Chairs, Grills, Bikes, Water Hoses, Flowerpots, Anything and Everything that is Loose) Anything can become a deadly missile in high winds. Tie down what you cannot take inside. If you evacuate, turn off the main electric power and water before leaving.

Flashlight and batteries-Blankets-Booster Cables-Fire Extinguisher-First Aid Kit Bottled <u>water</u>-Maps-Tire repair kit-Flares


